- 2. Enhance trade facilitation, economic integration and market access.
- 3. Ensure food security, food safety, better nutrition and equitable distribution.
- 4. Increase resilience to climate change, natural disasters and other shocks;
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■ Measures relate to plant health:

- Develop new and appropriate technologies, best practices and management systems to ensure food safety and address health/disease and environmental issues.
- Identify and eliminate NTBs that have no economic or scientific rationale and implement trade facilitation measures.
- Harmonize accreditation, inspection and certification so that uniform requirements will prevail ASEAN-wide, enabling the recognition of equivalence
- Streamline and improve quarantine systems and procedures, and harmonize standards and regulations.

 - Methodology for Conducting Pest Risk Analysis (PRA) to ensure consistent and harmonised approach toward the conduct of PRA for the development of these ASEAN Phytosanitary Guidelines

- 3) Establish ASEAN Framework on Pest Reporting
- 4) Establish ASEAN Framework for Emergency Response and Management of Prioritised Pests
- 5) Implementation of ASEAN Action Plan on Fall Armyworm 2020-202
- 6) ASEAN Regional Diagnostic Network (ARDN)

- E-learning modules on ASEAN Regional Guidelines for the Implementation of International Standards related to SPS Measures
 - Aims at enhancing the understanding and knowledge on SPS international standards to the AMS.
 - Four modules of the course are SPS international framework, pest risk analysis, food safety risk assessment, and animal import risk analysis.

ASEAN Good Agricultural Practices (ASEAN-GAP) for fruits/vegetables

- to serve as a basis for determining equivalence of different existing national standards, or as a blueprint to be adopted for those AMS currently without national standards systems in place.
- Four Modules: food safety, worker health safety, produce quality, environmental management
- Development of Mutual Recognition Arrangement (MRA) for ASEAN Agricultural best practices, covering ASEAN-GAP, ASEAN-GAP, ASEAN-GAHP.
